Bitter or Better: Doing More With Less



RaShad Bristo

RaShad Bristo's greatest wish since his growing up in Mansfield, LA was to become a police officer. His drive and determination led him to pursue that dream after graduating from Grambling State University with a Bachelor's degree in criminal justice. Soon afterward he was hired and deputized by DeSoto Parish Sheriff's Office, then sent to the police academy. After going through weeks of vigorous training, however, RaShad was denied certification to become a Peace Officer just days before graduation.

Opposition and discrimination met RaShad head on. Having one arm had all of a sudden become a crime in itself. Emotionally wounded and with a dream nearly shattered, he recalled the words that his grandfather told him as a boy, "Son, your disability does not define you, your determination does." God moved and blessed RaShad to become a certified Peace Officer.

After several years, RaShad is the only person in the State of Louisiana and the first person in the country with one arm to successfully graduate from a police academy and work in law-enforcement in the capacities of deputy sheriff, D.A.R.E. officer, juvenile probation officer and correctional officer.

Coming from a humble community, service to those around him as always been a

priority in his life which fuels his motivational speaking, his weekly talk show on KHAM Radio as well as propelled him to becoming a published author with a memoir of his life experiences that have helped to shape his walk in life.

In 2016, following his retirement from law enforcement, he was awarded the Ken Vince Memorial Award by the Governor John Bel Edwards' Outstanding Leadership on Disabilities award for his ongoing contributions to those with disabilities across the state.

Needed are 6-8 volunteers to pack books and activity items in the Rotary Learning Bus bags. These will be delivered to Atkins School for the children.



Our condolences to Rotarian Bob Neff for the death of his wife on February 13, 2021.


Bob and Pam were married for 52 years. Pam occasionally attended our meetings with Bob and he presented her with a Paul Harris Fellowship in 2015.





Happy 116th Birthday, Rotary!

Rotary started with the vision of one man—Paul Harris. The Chicago attorney formed the Rotary Club of Chicago on February 23, 1905, so professionals with diverse backgrounds could exchange ideas and form meaningful, lifelong friendships.

Over time, Rotary's reach and vision gradually extended to humanitarian service. Members have a long track record of addressing challenges in their communities and around the world.

On February 6, 1914, thirteen Shreveport men gathered at the Youree Hotel. Various professions and businesses were represented. The 13 men that attended established a unique meeting time of the club: 12:13 p.m.

On February 28, 1914, these original 13 men along with another 27 men formally organized and petitioned to be a member of the International Association of Rotary Clubs (now Rotary International). Our club was officially chartered as Club #109 on April 1, 1914.

Today there are 1.2 Million members in 35,000+ clubs in more than 200 countries and geographical areas.
