He is the author/editor of numerous books that grew out of his public radio documentary work, including the New York Times best sellers: Listening is an Act of Love, Mom: A Celebration of Mothers from StoryCorps, All There Is: Stories from StoryCorps, Ties That Bind: Stories of Love and Gratitude From the First Ten Years of StoryCorps and

Callings: The Purpose and Passion of Work.

In 2015 Dave was recognized with the TED Prize, awarded annually to one exceptional individual with a creative bold vision to spark global change.

TAKE ONE SMALL STEP, SHREVEPORT

Join us in Shreveport as we show the country what it means to have the courage to listen.

Is there someone with whom you disagree but still respect? Was there a moment, event or person in your life who shaped your political views? Do you feel misunderstood by people who have different beliefs than you?

Almost 90% of Americans say they are fed up with the divisions in our country and want to find a way out before it's too late.

Aren't we called at a moment like this to try to find a better way forward—together?

One Small Step is an effort to connect people so they can remember that people with whom we disagree are human beings. In doing so, we can begin to come together as a country—one conversation at a time.

Piloted by StoryCorps in 2018, One Small Step has been tested and is a proven method for undoing the culture of "us vs. them."

These One Small Step conversations bring together strangers with different political views to record a 40-minute conversation with each other about their lives. The process is seamless and powerful, and safe. All conversations take place virtually. Each interview becomes part of American history at the Library of Congress.

Conversations are not about politics, but about who we are as people, what we care about, and our dreams for the future. One Small Step helps us to move beyond the labels "Democrat" or "Republican," "liberal" or "conservative," and begin to see each other as human beings.

WHAT IS STORYCORPS?

Over 17 years, the non-profit public service organization **StoryCorps** has perfected a method for helping people feel more connected and less alone, for increasing hope and reminding us of the inherent worth of every life and every story. More than half a million Americans have participated in StoryCorps interviews to date, making it the largest single collection of human voices ever gathered. Interview recordings are preserved for history at the U.S. Library of Congress.

People take part in recording a session at StoryCorps because they know and love one another. As a response to the growing crisis of contempt in this country, in 2018 we started testing a new kind of interview session: one that gives strangers on opposite sides of the political divide the opportunity to talk about their lives with one another.

More than 1,000 people across 40 cities have recorded interviews. In One Small Step, we have a powerful method for bridging our differences. We see strangers across the political divides come together, look one another in the eye, and be reminded that it's hard to hate up close.

We hope you'll join us in taking One Small Step. It takes courage to listen to one another, but at this moment we are called to act. In the coming years, StoryCorps hopes to help convince the country that it's our patriotic duty to see the humanity in people with whom we may disagree.

Shreveport is one of four cities across the United States selected to lead this initiative with events and conversations taking place throughout 2021.


Gene Richardson Leads by Example

The downtown Shreveport Rotary Club has a long and storied tradition. It began with 13 members in 1914 and was the 109th such club created worldwide.

In 1967, a gentleman joined the club a month after his father, a Rotarian,




"It's not perfect attendance. Perfect attendance is someone who has never missed a weekly meeting. My father had perfect attendance going until he got sick. In my case, when I became ill, the club excused me. So I moved from perfect attendance to 100% attendance because I was excused."

The sickness he referred to in his case was an episode of cardiac arrest. The Downtown Rotary's traditional start time is in honor of the original 13 members and begins promptly at 12:13 p.m. While he was sitting at the head table of the meeting on that day, waiting for the clock to strike 12:13, he said he felt something funny. The next thing he knew, Dr. James Ciaravella, a member and noted local cardiologist, was "pounding on my chest when I came to. I told him, 'Stop, you're hurting me." Some off-duty firefighters were picking up extra money doing some remodeling in the hotel where the club met. They were quickly summoned and began life-saving efforts on the unconscious Richardson. In the meantime, Rotarians Dr. Juan Watkins and Dr. Ciaravella kept up their resuscitation efforts as well until an ambulance arrived.

When Richardson was whisked into the Schumpert Medical Center Emergency Room, he had lost consciousness again. In another strange bit of luck or fate, his personal cardiologist, Dr. Robert LaFargue, was in the ER conducting a tour. LaFargue excused himself from the group and began assisting the trauma team. Eventually, Dr. Ciaravella performed heart surgery on Richardson.
